Solidarity Fugitive Arrested

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The last major underground Solidarity leader, a fugitive since the 1981 martial law crackdown, has been captured by police, the government and the man's

daughter said Tuesday.

Kornel Morawiecki, leader of a militant Solidarity splinter group known as Fighting Solidarity, was arrested Monday night at an apartment in Wroclaw in southwestern Poland, government spokesman Jerzy Urban announced at the beginning of his weekly news conference.

Arrested with him was a 46-yearold woman identified only as Hanna

L., the spokesman said.

Urban said Morawiecki was being investigated for allegedly participating in a smuggling ring involving people in Poland and Sweden.

He also was said to have held false

identification papers.

The official news agency PAP said the smuggling was "subversive and anti-socialist."

The ring is suspected of smuggling into Poland an eavesdropping device, miniature cameras, tear gas canisters, sights for weapons and gas pis-

tols with cartridges, Urban said.

Morawiecki's daughter, Anna, said Tuesday from her home in Wroclaw she just learned of the arrest and that her brother, Mateusz Morawiecki, a university freshman, also was seized.

She said security agents from the Interior Ministry searched her father's home for six hours after the

arrest.

The elder Morawiecki, a physicist formerly employed as a researcher at Wroclaw Technical University, became active in opposition politics following a wave of university protests in 1968, his daughter said.

In 1979, he began publishing an underground journal, the Lower Silesia Bulletin, which was still being pub-

lished, she said.

Morawiecki had been charged with attacking Poland's foreign alliances but was not in custody on Dec. 13, 1981, when Polish leader Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski imposed martial law.

He happened to be out when security agents came to arrest him late that night, and has been a fugitive ever since, his daughter said.
